Lift your heart to the gods if you have no voice to sing.

Major Holidays of Kemetic Reform

Usually I write about the current season here, but this issue I have a different approach. As part of By-Laws for an incorporated church, I'd like for us to outline what our most important holidays are on the liturgical calendar. Depending on what Gods or Goddesses one honors personally, the year can be dotted with little observances and feast days, but certain holidays have major themes that most of us recognize and honor. By putting this in a formal document, we can hopefully give our faith further legal protection. I've counted nine. The list is below, but again, I strongly invite feedback on it. Should anything be taken out? Added? Combined? Write in, email or message me!

- **1. July 18 Kemetic New Year (Upet Ronpet)** (Probably our most important holiday, combined with dates of July 12 for the Day of Mosyt, and July 13-17 for the Days Upon the Year)
- 2. August 3-5 Wagy Djehutet Feasts (First feast of the dead, plus festival of Djehuty (Thoth))
- 3. September 3- 10 Opet Festival (Honoring Amun of Thebes)
- 4. November 2 -14 Khoiakh (Osiris) Mysteries (Most important festival of the Blessed Dead.)
- 5. November 15 Hab Sed and/or Coronation of the Sacred Falcon (Hab Sed would honor historical kings.)
- 6. January 13 Feast of Makhir (Filling the Sacred Eye) (The mid-year feast, can combine Feast of Lifting the Sky)
- 7. April 13 Kemetic Harvest (Feasts of Min, Khonsu, Rennutet) (Also honors Child Gods, such as Khonsu.)
- 8. Mid-to-Late April Beautiful Feast of the Valley (Final feast of the dead. Should date be lunar based?)
- 9. Late May Feast of the Beautiful Reunion (Honors Horus of Edfu and Hathor. As with no. 8, could be fixed or lunar. Have we missed any holidays? Are any less important to us today? What do you think?)



The ancient Egyptians might have recognized this as a harvest scene - except for the pumpkin, which is a native gourd of the New World. While most of us living in temperate regions of the Northern Hemisphere associate the harvest with the months of October and November, though, in Egypt the grain harvests traditionally come around March or April. Rennutet, protectress of the harvest and Goddess of nourishment, has a month and a festival named for Her that celebrates that all-important grain harvest. But we can still honor Rennutet as part of our modern autumn season, with its themes of ingathering and thankfulness for the blessings we've received throughout the year. It's one more way that ancient faith can adapt to new forms of expression. *Dua Rennutet!*
